MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Thank you for supporting us through what has been another brilliant term. For whichever year group we have arranged events, whether academic or performance based, we are fully appreciative of your engagement with us and what we are trying to achieve.

Students have had another fantastic couple of weeks. With PPEs and assessments having started this week, our Year 11 students had the opportunity to recently hear from Young Minds Matter about how to deal with and prepare for any additional stress they may be feeling at this time and in the lead up to their final exams in the summer. Year 11s are responding really positively to the encouragement and additional revision opportunities they have, from completing their bingo cards to asking for past exam papers to support revision.

In our recent parent surveys there have been some really helpful suggestions on how we can continue our improvement journey. In response to this we have recently upgraded our cashless catering system and will shortly be upgrading our management information system. These and other changes are intended to improve our communication flow and to ensure that you get the information you require in more timely ways.

We also responded to requests to ensure students receive more praise. We have chosen to start our days in roll call with additional positive messages and we have introduced our orange token system. We are thrilled with how students have responded to this with over 6000 tokens towards house points being given out over the last two months for actions in keeping with our school values. We would encourage you to talk to your child about the positive message given with each token they receive. We are also excited to launch our birthday tie initiative and our PlayStation Schools Cup competition. Whilst our core business will always remain safeguarding and academic success of our students, we will continue



to look for new ways to ensure students have multiple ways to shine.

With half term upon us, I want to remind Year 11s of the opportunity to boost their performance in practical subjects by attending the half term sessions. For all other year groups, I wish them well in their preparation towards their assessments, which will start on Monday 27 February. The next training session gave the team their first experience of Dartmoor and let them put their new navigation skills to good use.





ART ACADEMY

Art Academy is an after-school academy which is held every Tuesday, for students in Years 7 and 8. Miss Price runs the academy, with guest appearance from Miss Trumm, and is aimed anyone who enjoys Art and techniques such as drawing, painting and making.

What kind of activities do we do?

We do mini workshops of lots of different techniques, such as drawing, building in 3D and painting. Last term, we had the opportunity to take part in a community project, where we made a Christmas tree and decorations to be displayed in Christchurch in Coleford. These kinds of projects are not only great for developing skills and community links, but they can also go towards students earning Character Education badges. We also looked at several oil pastel techniques including Monoprinting and Sgraffito. These help develop your colour theory and mark-making skills.



What is Art Academy doing this term?

This term we are staring off by looking at sewing skills, initially looking at different hand sewing stitches and making creative keyrings.

Next, we will look at how sewing and textiles are used in Art. Later in the term, we will look at painting skills, including the textures and marks you can create, how to blend colours and how to combine skills to create eye-catching, detailed paintings.




CELEBRATE SPEAKING!

The Crossing by Manjeet Mann


A trailblazing new novel about two teenagers from opposite worlds; *The Crossing* is a profound story of hope, grief, and the very real tragedies of the refugee crisis.

The Perks of Being A Wallflower by Stephen Chbosky

The Perks of Being a Wallflower is a deeply affecting coming-of-age story that will spirit you back to those wild and poignant roller-coaster days known as growing up.

Charlie is a freshman. And while he's not the biggest geek in the school, he is by no means

popular. Shy, introspective, intelligent beyond his years yet socially awkward, he is a wallflower, caught between trying to live his life and trying to run from it.

Charlie is attempting to navigate his way through uncharted territory: the world of first dates and mix-tapes, family dramas and new friends; the world of sex, drugs, and The Rocky Horror Picture Show, when all one requires is that perfect song on that perfect drive to feel infinite. But Charlie can't stay on the sideline forever.

Standing on the fringes of life offers a unique perspective. But there comes a time to see what it looks like from the dance floor. In 2012, Stephen Chbosky adapted the story that was first published in 1999, for the big screen, with a film starring Emma Watson and Logan Lerman in the lead role of Charlie.



STEM SOCIETY TRIP

Our STEM society (Y7 and 8) visited the Mechanical Art and Design Museum in Stratford. This museum showcases mechanical works of art looking mainly at kinetic art. Energy stores (of which kinetic is one) is a very important theme in Physics and it is important to have a grounding in this if any of our students want to progress into STEM careers (engineering, science, technology). The students thoroughly enjoyed comparing energy stores and building their own intricate marble runs in the marble run room utilising gravitational potential and kinetic energy stores.
