#### MR HAYWARD - HEAD OF KEY STAGE 3

We have roughly five weeks left and students will be beginning their summer assessments, which will be their last round of data this year. The Key Stage 3 assessment window runs from 19-30 June. All students have Knowledge Organisers and Assessment Manifests which will aid their revision. If a student is missing anything we encourage them to ask their tutor or class teacher so that they have all of the required resources. Within the Assessment Manifest there is an exam timetable.

The Year 9 options process is now complete, as you will know we have been waiting to confirm next year's staffing before releasing the finalised choices. All students in Year 9 were given their confirmed options in a letter on 14 June by their tutors - if for whatever reason a student was absent they can collect their letter from their tutor. There is an email address on the letter to direct any questions relating to options.

There are some key dates coming up with Sports Days on the 13 and 14 of July and the Greenshaw Athletics Tournament that we organise at the Prince of Wales Stadium on 11 July, these will be some fantastic events to round off the year.

The time has arrived for us to say goodbye to our 2023 Year 11 cohort, with the final exam on Wednesday. Our students have continued to work so hard and show such dedication to their learning. I would also like to thank the teachers who have provided all of the extra Period 6 and Champions Hour sessions as well as the parents and carers who continue to work with us in supporting our young people in their success. The invites went out this week for our leavers assembly on Tuesday and we look forward to sharing memories with students

and carrying out the traditional shirt signing. We also have our Prom to look forward to. Parents should expect more information in the next week in relation to this.

Monday marks the very first PPE series for Year 10s. Students will be sitting their assessments in exam areas under the same exam conditions as their official exams. 

Our Reading Programme Lead, Miss Phelps shares her picks for Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4.




**Talking to Alaska** by Anna Woltz

It only takes one day at their new school for Parker and Sven to become mortal enemies. Parker's had a terrible summer and just wants to be invisible, while Sven is desperate to make an impression and be known as anything other than 'that kid with epilepsy.'

When Parker discovers her beloved dog Alaska – who she had to give away last year – now belongs to Sven, she's determined to steal her back. Of course, that's much easier said than done...

Meanwhile, Sven is mortified when Alaska is brought to meet him wearing her fluorescent Assistance Dog vest. Having epilepsy feels like he has no control over his life anymore, so when Parker – face covered and in disguise – arrives in his bedroom at midnight to take Alaska back, there's something new to think about. But after spilling all his secrets to her, what'll happen if he uncovers her real identity?

Told in alternating chapters between the two characters, this is a heartfelt story about understanding others. It's a relatively short read, but Anna Woltz packs a lot in, including themes of bullying, trauma, and coping with life-altering situations, while the characters make unexpected discoveries about friendship — and a special discovery about Alaska too.

Thank you to all the students who applied, everyone who took part in the process did brilliantly and should be proud.




### WE WILL ROCK YOU

#### KINDNESS INITIATIVE

"In A World Where You Can Do Or Be Anything, Aim High, Work Hard, Be Kind..."

As you will be aware, before Easter, students were asked to complete our annual student survey and the results were clear - our students want to attend a kinder school. This week, it has been exciting to launch new initiatives on how we will be instilling the virtue of kindness in our students over the coming weeks and months.

We are also pleased to announce the following:

While our vision for the year 2023/2024 remains the same, we have refined our mission statement to better align with our commitment to creating a positive and inclusive school environment. Our updated mission is as follows: "We make our vision possible by creating a sense of purpose, belonging, and meaning that allows individuals to aim high, work hard, and be kind."

To reinforce the importance of kindness in our school community, we have adopted a new mantra: "Aim high, work hard, and be kind." This mantra will be integrated into our daily communications with students and parents, ensuring that it becomes a guiding principle in their actions and interactions.

Kindness will serve as our new virtue, and we are excited to update our existing five values to reflect this essential attribute. The updated value pledges will now include language that encourages and expects kindness, such as compassion, courtesy, understanding, decency, emphasising its significance within our school community.

We will be using our Character Education programme to support the development of our new virtue. Starting from the upcoming academic year, our Character Education programme will incorporate a new kindness badge. This badge can be earned by students who consistently demonstrate habits of kindness. It will serve as a symbol of recognition for their exemplary behaviour and will inspire others to follow suit.

In addition, we are pleased to inform you that a new purple token has been created to reward students who are kind to each other and their community. Each token is worth 50 house points and will be awarded to students who consistently display kind habits. They will hold significant prestige within our school and act as a special acknowledgment of their compassionate actions. Furthermore, we are introducing a new kindness postcard, similar to our black values postcards. These purple postcards will be used to recognise and appreciate those students who demonstrate kindness day in, day out. It will be a wonderful way to highlight and celebrate their continuous commitment to being kind.



To celebrate acts of kindness and their positive impact on our school community, we will be organising a Kindness Buffet, much like our Golden Ticket events. This special occasion will serve as a platform to honour and acknowledge those students who make a difference with their kindness.

We will also be hosting Random Acts of Kindness weeks at various points during the year. These events will encourage students to engage in acts of kindness that go above and beyond, fostering a culture of compassion and empathy within our school community.



#### **DUKE OF EDINBURGH EVENTS**

Last weekend, our Duke of Edinburgh students completed their training and practice expeditions around the local area. They walked just over 18 miles altogether over the three days and navigated fantastically despite the very overgrown paths - they described nettles and weeds over head height!
