#### SPORTING SUCCESS

We've had a very strong week of sport again here at Five Acres High School. Firstly, our Year 7 and Year 8 cricketers were involved in a tournament hosted by Holmleigh Park. The team were up against two teams from Holmleigh as well as St Peter's. Some excellent batting and bowling performances led to the team being unbeaten in the tournament.

The Greenshaw Athletics Tournament, an event we organise and is run at the Prince of Wales Stadium in Cheltenham, took place on Tuesday 11 July. We had a fantastic event and became Greenshaw Athletics Champions for the third time in a row! We dominated the field events in particular. Our shot, discus, javelin and long jump technique really set us apart from the other schools and gave us a great lead.

The event is broken down into four teams and an overall score is given. Y8 boys came first , Y8 girls came second (losing out by just 1pt), Y10 boys came first and Y10 girls came joint first. The results were impressive given that there were five schools competing. The overall results were Five Acres High School first , Yate Academy second, Holmleigh Park third, Gloucester Academy fourth and Henley Bank High School fifth. Well done to all of our superb athletes.

We were due our two days of Sports Days but unfortunately have had to postpone the Athletics portion due to the forecast of poor weather. We aim to complete this event next week. We did manage a full day of Summer Team Sports. All students (other than a couple of injured students) took part in this event and have therefore contributed to their houses. 






# READING RECOMMENDATIONS

Murder Most Unladylike by Robin Stevens


A Murder Most Unladylike is from a collection of stories by Robin Stevens. They are a collection of stories that follow two schoolgirls in the 1930s in England to solve their first murder mystery.

When Daisy Wells and Hazel Wong set up their very own secret detective agency at Deepdean School for Girls, they struggle to find any truly exciting mysteries to investigate. (Unless you count the case of Lavinia's missing tie. Which they don't.)

Then Hazel discovers the Science Mistress, Miss Bell, lying dead in the Gym. She assumes it was a

terrible accident – but when she and Daisy return five minutes later, the body has disappeared. Now Hazel and Daisy not only have a murder to solve: they have to prove one happened in the first place.

Determined to get to the bottom of the crime before the killer strikes again (and before the police Hastings Research Institute take a can get there first, naturally), Hazel and Daisy must hunt for evidence, spy on their suspects and use all the cunning and intuition they can muster. But will they succeed? And can their friendship stand the test? True chemistry results.



**Lessons In Chemistry** by Bonnie Garmus

This book is a national New York Times best seller and is set in the 1960s in California. It follows the singular female voice of Elizabeth Zott as she tries to make her way in a male dominated world. Smart, funny, joyous and powerful, Garmus' 60s set debut featuring an

unconventional female scientist with a quiet game-plan to change the world has won the hearts and minds of our booksellers and was undoubtedly one of 2022's most gloriously enjoyable debuts.

It is the early 1960s and Elizabeth Zott's all-male team at very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the Ionely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with - of all things - her mind.

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later, Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ('combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride') proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.

# **ART EXHIBITION**


