# Message from the Headteacher

Welcome to the latest edition of the school newsletter. It has been a brilliant couple of weeks and a special congratulations need to be given to our Year 11 students who have now completed their final set of PPEs and our Year 7 students who achieved the school attendance target for four days in a row (96%).

As some of you will have noticed education continues to be a hot topic within the media, including attendance, so I would like to quickly address our position on the Government's guidance around mobile phone use in particular. You will know from our policy that we have taken the stance of allowing mobile phones to be carried on site, but they are to be in bags and on silent during the school day. We have not taken the decision to completely ban mobile phones, which is one of the four suggested actions provided in the guidance, because we understand the need for students to use them for bus e-tickets and to have that safety net if they are walking to and from school. Students have recently been reminded that if a mobile phone is seen on the school site (once they have left the main road around school), a detention

will be applied and the phone will be confiscated until home time.

You may have also noticed mentioned in the media that last week featured World Book Day. We have great pride in the fact that we read at both ends of the day and that students hit levels well above the national average for reading within months of joining us. It was a pleasure seeing so many students involved in the multiple fun activities that were provided by our literacy team during the week which included the big book quiz, reviews of their favourite books and book cover treasure hunt. We were also delighted to provide a number of books this week to some lucky students.

We take great pride in providing an excellent environment for students to learn in, the site team in particular work tirelessly to ensure we make the most of our facilities. We also have a strong commitment to protecting our environment through our eco projects. Whilst we regularly remind students about the need to maintain facilities, there are occasions where specific reminders need to be made about how we treat them and our local




environment. Over the last couple of weeks there has been a craze for bringing in lollypops. This has led to an increase in litter of both the plastic wrappers and the sticks, so we have taken the decision to no longer allow them on the school site. Today we will issue students with some clear guidance around this and would ask for your support in ensuring that lollypops are not brought into school. By reducing the waste associated with lollypops we are helping you to count less in the Big Plastic Count (see page 6 for more information).


English Teacher, Miss Butler shares her picks for Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4.



*Midnight Library* by Matt Haig

Between life and death there is a library. When Nora Seed finds herself in the Midnight Library, she has a chance to make things right. Up until now, her life has been full of misery and regret. She feels she has let everyone down, including herself. But things are about to change.

The books in the Midnight Library enable Nora to live as if she had done things differently. With the help of an old friend, she can now undo every one of her regrets as she tries to work out her perfect life. But things aren't always what she imagined they'd be, and soon her choices place the library and herself in extreme danger. Before time runs out, she must answer the ultimate question: what is the best way to live?



Friends, Lovers, and Big Terrible Thing. A Memoir by Matthew Perry

Here is the riveting story of acclaimed actor Matthew Perry, who takes us along on his journey from childhood ambition to fame to addiction and recovery in the aftermath of a life-threatening health scare. Before the frequent hospital visits and stints in rehab, there was five-year-old Matthew, who travelled from Montreal to Los Angeles, shuffling between his separated parents; fourteen-yearold Matthew, who was a nationally ranked tennis star in Canada; twenty-four-year-old Matthew, who nabbed a coveted role as a lead cast member on the talkedabout pilot then called Friends Like Us. . . and so much more.

In an extraordinary story that only he could tell - and in the heartfelt, hilarious, and warmly familiar way only he could tell it -Matthew Perry lays bare the fractured family that raised him (and also left him to his own devices), the desire for recognition that drove him to fame, and the void inside him that could not be filled even by his greatest dreams coming true. But he also details the peace he's found in sobriety and how he feels about the ubiquity of Friends, sharing stories about his cast mates and other stars he met along the way. Frank, selfaware, and with his trademark humour, Perry vividly depicts his lifelong battle with addiction and what fuelled it despite seemingly having it all.

Friends, Lovers, and the Big Terrible Thing is an unforgettable memoir that is both intimate and eye-opening - as well as a hand extended to anyone struggling with sobriety. Unflinchingly honest, moving, and uproariously funny, this is the book fans have been waiting for.

# BIG PLASTIC COUNT 11-17 MARCH



By joining thousands of people across the country and counting all the plastic you throw away for a week, you can gather the vital evidence we need to convince UK ministers, supermarkets and big brands to lead the way at the global talks that could finally phase out plastic production for good.

Let's get counting to make the Global Plastics Treaty as big and bold as it can be.

#### The Big Plastic Count. What is it and how do you get involved?

Nearly 100 billion pieces of plastic packaging are thrown away every year by households in the UK. As part of our school eco drive we want to contribute to the Global Plastic Treaty and take part in a national scheme The Big Plastic Count. Your child has brought home a tally sheet you can complete by recording the plastic thrown away in your household. This is also a great opportunity for your child to receive their bronze environment Character Education badge and every entry will receive a house point!

#### How to take part?

From Monday 11 March in the morning until Sunday 17 March in the evening, count as you throw! Simply mark every piece of plastic package as you throw it away on the Let's Count Tally Sheet. Students have been able to pick these up in assemblies

1. Put the Let's Count Tally Sheet up on your fridge, or near your bin or recycling.

2. Tell everyone you live with that you're going to be taking part and ask them to include their plastic waste in the count too.

3. Using the Let's Count Tally Sheet, record the different types of household plastic packaging waste you use for one week. This includes plastic going in your bin and plastic you put out for recycling.

4. Use the Plastic ID Tool to look up plastic items if you need to.

5. Remember to write down any piece of plastic packaging you use while out and about, then mark it on your tally sheet when you get back home.

#### What not to count

Don't include: plasters, medication packaging, non-dairy milk/juice cartons, nappies, dog poo bags, plastic cutlery or period products.

We don't want to include plastic items that are used for medical or sanitary reasons, or by people with disabilities who rely on plastic items for independence.

Also, we are not counting coffee cups or Tetra Pak, the plasticised cardboard material that many juice/milk cartons are made of.


# **DANCE SUCCESS**









